We offer young Europeans opportunities for exchange, personal development and to take part in active citizenship.



In order to achieve our goals, the Foundation works with the following programme lines:



The Schwarzkopf Foundation strives to empower young people from all backgrounds to be active European citizens who contribute to a pluralistic, democratic society of mutual understanding, solidarity and peaceful collaboration across Europe.

Shaping Europe

- The youth-driven network European Youth Parliament brings together young people from across Europe to exchange perspectives and debate the pressing issues of our time.
- The Young European of the Year award is given to young Europeans who show outstanding commitment to a peaceful, diverse and inclusive Europe.

Experiencing Europe

- Through our travel grants, we support young people in exploring Europe and promoting an inclusive, pluralistic society.
- As part of the <u>Competence Network</u> "Living Together in a Migration Society", we strengthen the political participation and representation of young people of all origins.

Understanding Europe

 The youth-driven educational network Understanding Europe offers courses for school classes & strengthens young people's understanding of different European topics.

Discussing Europe

- For our <u>discussion events</u>, we bring young people into conversation with decision-makers and experts on topics concerning Europe.
- The platform <u>Young Islam Conference</u> promotes dialogue between young people of various backgrounds and takes up questions of our migration society.

Reflecting Europe

- The Margot Friedländer Award supports young people maintaining a living culture of remembrance and commemoration of the Holocaust.
- The programme Young Ambassadors Against Antisemitism encourages young people to stand up against antisemitism and racism.

Understanding Europe

Unterstanding Europe is an educational network run by and for young people. This youth-led network offers courses for school classes, transnational training events and a fellowship programme, strengthening young Europeans' civic participation.

Understanding Europe, currently active in 13 European Understanding Europe's formats are based on the countries, is committed to a democratic, diverse and open-minded Europe. The network creates protected spaces for young people to learn about and discuss Europe, the media, participation, social justice and other issues that young people care about.

Activities

- Our youth organisations offer workshops at schools for young people between the ages of 14-20. There, participants can talk about relevant European issues without being graded.
- The annual European Summer School brings together 25 experienced peers from all over Europe for a 4-day programme on how to train Trainers in their own countries.
- Trainings for Trainers are implemented by our youth organisations on site. It is here that members learn how to bring our workshops into local classrooms.





- In two Coordinators' Meetings per year, network members running the project on site exchange best practices and receive training on non-profit project management.
- With a Fellowship Programme, we support young Europeans in developing new and innovative workshop formats. These are then integrated into our course offers.
- Our open-source educational materials and publications are developed by young people and experts in the field.

- About 200 of our peers bring European issues into classrooms every year.
- Peers reach up to 6,000 students from 13 countries per year.
- At the Summer School, 25 young people are qualified to conduct trainings for their local teams.
- Twice a year, **20 peers** are trained to implement the project at local levels.
- Every year, we support up to **6 Fellows** to develop new, innovative educational formats.
- The educational network creates 1-2 publications on educational approaches and our focus topics each year.



Discussion events

Decision-makers in dialogue with young people

Young people are crucial actors for Europe's democratic future. They have decisive perspectives on relevant issues and want to be heard. We support them in being active European citizens by getting them into conversation with decision-makers and experts, thereby gaining knowledge and participating in important discourses.

We organise **discussion events** on relevant topics to bring young people together with inspiring leaders and personalities. In direct exchange with high-level European and federal politicians, journalists, activists and scientists, we offer the chance for participants to **experience politics and European issues up-close**.

The discussion formats offered focus on our young audience and exchange rather than having long lectures. As part of this, **young people take over moderation and ask the questions that they want to discuss**.

Topics include European politics, the impact of climate change and the rise of new activist movements, the role of the media in democratic processes, current geopolitical crises and long-term visions for Europe's future, following issue areas that shape young people's future. We discuss the role of minorities in European society, how to tackle the rise of populism and nationalism and how young people can get more engaged in politics. "With its events, the Schwarzkopf Foundation offers something that schools cannot do: direct contact with well-known personalities from politics and society. Young people get to know the ones who make decisions and shape Europe with their ideas. Without barriers, youth can freely ask their questions and talk to politicians, scientists and contemporary witnesses."

Young Islam Conference

Shaping migration societies

The Young Islam Conference (JIK) is an exchange platform and empowerment space on questions pertaining to Islam and on living together in our migration societies. Most JIK formats are aimed at young people affected by racism and allies to help shape an inclusive society. As a civil society actor, the JIK reaches out to stakeholders from the fields of politics, media and civil society.

Figures

- The Young Islam Conference has 500 network members.
- Our network is active in 7 German states.
- The JIK has organised 27 conferences (11 federal and 16 state conferences).

The JIK was established in 2011 and, since 2019, is a programme line at the Schwarzkopf Foundation Young Europe. The JIK is funded by the Mercator Foundation, the Federal Agency for Civic Education/bpb and the Federal Ministry for Family Affairs, Senior Citizens, Women and Youth as part of the federal programme "Live Democracy!"

Formats

- Fostering dialogue: In conference and networking formats, the JIK creates opportunities for encounters and encourages its young network to participate in public debates, shaping an inclusive society.
- Multi-perspective discourse: JIK Talks are public formats that illuminate debates on Islam in different, constructive ways. JIK Talks are about going beyond clichés, stereotypical images and perceived truths by offering multiple perspectives on issues and allowing for different viewpoints.
- Skills development: Islam and Muslims are constant subjects of media coverage. Not infrequently, this results in stereotypical portrayals that make young Muslims feel misrepresented. For this reason, the JIK coaches network members in learning to engage with different media tools to circulate their own narratives and perspectives on societal issues.



- Training multipliers: The Summer Acedemy is a JIK training format that enables JIK members as multipliers and to delve deeper into key topics, applying what they have learned in their own life contexts and passing their knowledge on to others.
- Advocating for diversity: The JIK organises outreach roundtables with decision-makers to engage in conversations about Islam and Muslims in Germany, diversity, participation and representation. The JIK conducts studies and publishes papers regularly on perspectives of the network in a post-migrant society.
- Campaigning for narrative change: The European Post-migrant Academy trains young Europeans in strategic communication to strengthen narratives on an open, post-migrant Europe that is critical of racism.

Young European of the Year



The award grants 5,000 euros for a six-month internship with a member of the European Parliament or with another European institution. It is also possible to finance a recipient's own project that promotes European integration. The award winner will become part of a European network and the jury of the Young European of the Year award.

Award winners and their impact

Since 1997, dedicated and inspiring people engaged in different fields of interest have been granted this award. The award was first given on the occasion of the Foundation's 25th anniversary by Klaus Kinkel, former German Foreign Minister, to David Stulik at the Hamburg Übersee Club. Here are the recent award winners:

2022 Anahita Neghabat from Austria is a social anthropologist and mememaking political educator. In her work, Anahita uses memes as a visual vocabulary, medium and tool for political commentary, reaching a broad and young audience of almost 24,000 people on Instagram – speaking from an intersectional feminist, anti-racist and anti-authoritarian perspective.

2020 Mariya Atanasova is a mentor for youth from the Roma community and a member of the European Roma Youth Network in Bulgaria. She studied midwifery for her bachelor's degree and political science for her master's degree. She is involved in various organisations for young people affected by discrimination and social difficulties. As a young Roma woman, she advocates for more visibility of Roma in Europe, and supports children and youth in her community.





2021 **Constantin-Alexandru Manda** from Romania is campaigning for fair and equal education for all children in his country. In 2013, at just the age of 14, he founded one of Romania's first student associations and succeeded in getting the Romanian government to guarantee a minimum scholarship for every child in need.



2019 Yasmine Ouirhrane was honoured in 2019 as Young European of the Year for her commitment to equal rights for women and equal participation opportunities for migrants in Europe. At 23, she was already a scholarship recipient of the Women Deliver's Young Leader program, organised the European Youth Forum's "YO!" festival in Strasbourg in 2018, and has been involved in projects with young people in disadvantaged neighbourhoods in France.

European Youth Parliament



The European Youth Parliament (EYP) brings together young people from across Europe to debate the pressing issues of our time.

Since 1987, the European Youth Parliament has inspired and empowered hundreds of thousands of young people to be open-minded, tolerant and active citizens. With over 30,000 participants and 500 activities each year, we are one of Europe's largest youth platforms for civic education - run by young people, for young people.

Facts & Figures

- The EYP network is active in 40 countries across Europe.
- More than **30,000 young people**, including 3,500 volunteers, take part in EYP events every year.
- Over **500 EYP events** are organised annually across Europe (at local, national and international levels).
- Since 1987, the number of EYP Alumni has grown to over **200,000**.
- After the international session, 99% of participants felt that they were motivated to address issues that affect the people and environment around them.
- 94% of participants felt that they learned to recognise and respect different perspectives during the session.



Post-migrant Europe

Europe cannot only be taught - it must be experienced. That is why we offer travel grants for individual and organised group travel. In our group travel format, we aim to make lively migration societies visible and enable young people from marginalised backgrounds to share their experiences and pass their knowledge on to others.

As part of this work, we bring 15 young people from Europe together with organisations, initiatives and associations from the migration society on an educational trip. During such a trip, participants become contributors and report on their experiences online and offline.

We also provide a learning platform with the Instagram channel @postmigrant_europe and our You-Tube channel. By covering current challenges and

debates in a post-migrant Europe, we inspire young people to confront ideologies of inequality that are at odds with a vision of an open, democratic and pluralistic Europe.

Through these channels, the complexity of post-migrant societies in Europe and the ideologies of inequality that persist are discussed in digital lectures, video clips and interviews.

- Inequality ideologies within migrant and nonmigrant communities in Europe, and how tolerance of ambiguity and difference-sensitive knowledge and action can be taught as competences for pluralistic societies in Europe

The Competence Network "Living Together in Migration Societies" offers **counselling**, **educational formats**, **qualification** and **dialogue sessions** for educators from the field of child and youth welfare and for volunteers and multipliers. The aim is to make child and youth welfare more sensitive to diversity and racism, and to support young people from different backgrounds in making their voices heard as active citizens of a pluralistic, inclusive and democratic migration society.

Young Ambassadors Against Antisemitism (YAAA) is a network of young people with diverse backgrounds from all over Germany who are standing up against antisemitism and racism and for a post-migrant culture of remembrance. The network members are contributing as **peer experts on the present and future of a post-migrant society.**

What we remember and how we look at the past is always a mirror of the present. Thus, what is constituted as a 'collective past' is a reflection of the cultural and political discussions in our present society. The basis of this project is the understanding of a post-migrant society shaped not by a single narrative, but by a diversity of perspectives and histories - by continuities, ruptures and entanglements. How can this be reflected in the way we talk about German history in the future?

This and many other questions are addressed by the network. YAAA grows every year by a group of twelve young people from all over Germany. As part of a **one year educational programme**, the YAAAs get to know activists, academics, artists, associations, initiatives and organisations engaged in this topic. Together, they deal with lines of continuity in the field of antisemitism and racism by critiquing hegemonic discourses and reflecting on their own social position(s), as well as the socio-political relevance of these topics.

YAAAs learn how to formulate positions and attitudes, develop their own projects and pass on their knowledge.

Since 2014, the Margot Friedländer Award has called on young people from all over Germany to find their own perspectives to commemorate the Holocaust and its aftermath by creating interactive projects.

This award supports young people in standing up against today's forms of antisemitism, racism, antiziganism and exclusion for a pluralistic migration society.

Named after the Holocaust survivor Margot Friedländer, this award keeps the memory of the crimes of National Socialism alive for younger generations. The Schwarzkopf Foundation Young Europe contributes prize money of up to 5,000 euros and provides educational support for innovative project ideas.
